PASTORAL SHARINGS

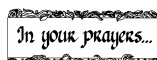
The gospel reading has several metaphors that are interesting in terms of praying. We are to ask, to seek, and to knock. If we do, it will be given to us, we will find what we need, and the door will be opened to us. When we pray, or ask, we shouldn't do it once and think that is enough. Keep on asking. God wants our persistence. We are there with God, and God is there hearing us. Keep on asking. If you feel like a beggar, that is all right. Keep on asking. And when you seek, it is as if you are searching for wisdom, and God is the source of all wisdom, so keep on seeking. When you knock, it is as if you are hoping to be received and allowed to enter, so keep on knocking.

Many of us have seen the picture of a door at which you knock, knowing that Jesus is on the other side of that wooden door. If it makes you feel homeless and destitute, all the more reason to keep on knocking. What is on the other side of the door is more than we can imagine in our wildest dreams. Jesus is there! He is waiting for us to knock so He can open that door and welcome us in with Him. Jesus promises us this. And He makes it very clear when He talks about what a generous father would do to a child asking for something. "How much more does the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him?"

You might say, "But I didn't ask for the Holy Spirit. I asked for a decent job. Or I asked for a raise. Or I asked for a good mortgage. Or I asked to be healed of cancer, or Alzheimer's, or Hodgkin's, or shingles. Or you say you didn't ask for yourself but for your child, or your parent, or your neighbor, or your country. You wanted your soldier son or daughter home safe and sound. You wanted a safe delivery of a child. You wanted . . . you wanted. . . you wanted. And God knows what you need. And God gives you what you need. And God loves you more than you know or believe. And God loves all of us.
